They met as committee co-chairs working to support an organization they both cared about and quickly became friends.

"Gary is absolutely one of my favorite people," said Hampson. "I'm impressed with his dedication and contribution. I've gotten to see Gary and Julia in many different facets; as co-chairs, as friends, and a few years back we became neighbors!"

"All this is thanks to the McNabb Center. Working with good charities, you get to meet the most highquality people on the planet, and that's definitely Gary and Julia," remarked Hampson. David Goodson, past Clayfest committee member and longtime volunteer and supporter of the Center, was also quick to offer praise for this dedicated couple who volunteered alongside the Goodsons and whose children grew up together.

"Gary is the kind of the guy who any time he's involved in something he is willing to do much more than just show up. He's willing to do the work, and that's evident in everything that he's done from Knox Heritage to his work with the McNabb Center," said Goodson.

"When I'm looking for help with a charitable board, I never hesitate to ask the Bentleys because I know that they'll do more than just put their name on the list. They're willing to invest their time, energy and money to support what's going on."

#### LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

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In 2022, the Helen Ross McNabb Foundation led recording-breaking campaigns, celebrated 50 years of supporting the McNabb Center and welcomed back many of the community's favorite events and traditions.

The Foundation joined the Center in opening Dogwood Springs, a 50-unit residential facility for seniors with mental health disorders. At \$8.2 million dollars, Dogwood Springs is the largest Foundation project in its 50-year history.

The Foundation also completed a \$4.3 million capital campaign to develop domestic violence transitional housing in Knox County. The facilities will be located on a large 10+ acre site include three multi-unit apartment buildings, group meeting space, a large commercial playground and on-site offices. Residents of this development will be transitioning out of the McNabb Center's 32-bed domestic violence emergency shelter. This project upon completion will be dedicated in memory of Sarah Stowers, a longtime supporter, advocate, volunteer and friend of the McNabb Center.

Trinity Health Foundation awarded \$150,000 of their Phase II Grant for the Center's Blount County residential reentry program for women returning to the community following incarceration.

These successful campaigns and awards were but a few of the many achievements celebrated at the Helen Ross McNabb Foundation's 50th Anniversary gathering. Almost two hundred stakeholders, donors, board members and staff gathered at the Quarry to acknowledge half a century of service and giving.

The Foundation also provided \$900,000 through its annual granting process to offset construction and renovation costs related to the Centerpointe Detox and Residential Treatment Facility expansion. This grant funding is in addition to the \$3 million raised in 2021 for this important project. Also, the Foundation established the Ben Goodson Gratitude Fund to help

fund the cost of substance use treatment services for uninsured clients or low-income individuals with few resources.

After the COVID-19 years, Foundation event attendance bounced back and hit record numbers. Sunset Shenanigans Cosmic Drive and Putt, a nifty, nighttime, neon golf event introduced in 2021, grew in its second year, adding teams and new games like foot golf which was quickly adopted as a crowd favorite.

The Spirit Award Dinner honoring Debby and Mitch Steenrod hit an all-time high for net revenue at \$260,000. In Morristown, the Evening of Hope honored long-time supporters Sandy & Andy Smith with a sold-out crowd at the Country Club. The Russell Biven Clayfest also had a banner year with the first net revenue of over \$100,000 in the history of the event.

The Knoxville Challenger Tennis Tournament brought over \$210,000 for the Center and rush of excitement as the Challenger winner, Ben Shelton, played in the Australian Open Quarter Finals just weeks after his victory in Knoxville.

The McNabb Foundation is proud to support the McNabb Center as it reaches the milestone 75th year of improving lives in East Tennessee.





#### CURRENT CAMPAIGN

#### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

#### Campaign Goal: \$4,300,000

Domestic violence is a pervasive issue in East Tennessee. In 2018, Knox County law enforcement responded to 18,130 domestic violence-related calls and Tennessee ranks as fifth in the United States for women killed by men. Of those deaths, 93 percent were murdered by someone they knew.


There is a lack of safe and affordable housing options in Knox County, which may prevent individuals from leaving an abusive partner. In Knox County, the wait for public housing is three to six months. Victims of domestic violence are at higher risk of assault or homicide after separating from their abuser, which further underscores the importance of safe housing.

In 2018, the McNabb Center's domestic violence programming served 323 adult and child survivors. The Center's domestic violence hotline received 1,517 calls; however, 326 requests for shelter went unmet.

The Helen Ross McNabb Foundation launched a capital funds campaign in support of new and expanded transitional housing for women and families escaping a domestic violence situation. Funds raised for transitional housing will be restricted to acquisition of the site and construction of the apartment project development. The goal of the campaign, co-chaired by Debbie Jones and Ted Flickinger, is to raise \$4,300,000. When complete the project will result in the creation of six two-bedroom apartment units, six one-bedroom apartment units and on-site offices for McNabb Center Staff and group meeting space.







#### **BEN GOODSON GRATITUDE FUND**

The Ben Goodson Gratitude Fund was created in memory of Ben Goodson by David, Nancy, Neil and Elisabeth Goodson and Daniel Standish, as well as other donors. Ben was a long-time volunteer for the Helen Ross McNabb Foundation and served in many volunteer roles including the Russell Biven Clayfest committee, Dear Santa Elf Shopping and as a founding member of the Sunset Shenanigans Cosmic Drive and Putt event.

Ben was the idealistic volunteer. He greeted others with a smile and warmth at each committee meeting and event site. Ben would arrive earlier and stay longer than asked and would even jump in and help at the Foundation events where he was a participant and not even signed up as a volunteer. He cared deeply about the mission of the McNabb Center and worked hard to secure new donor support and event sponsorship dollars. All of the staff of the Helen Ross McNabb Foundation are very grateful for Ben's longstanding service and for his friendship. The Foundation is exceedingly pleased with the creation of this important fund in his memory.

The Ben Goodson Gratitude Fund is being established with the intent to serve a vital need within the McNabb Center. Each year, the Center serves thousands of adolescents

and adults struggling with substance abuse disorders through its continuum of detoxification, long-term residential, outpatient and medically assisted treatment programs. Many of these individuals are uninsured, have limited insurance benefits or cannot afford treatment for other reasons. The Ben Goodson Gratitude Fund is intended to support the financial cost associated with serving the needs of these clients immediately and permanently into the future. Those served may never know of this fund or its impact on their lives, but their families and our community will feel the benefit.

The inaugural McNabb Center Golf Tournament in Chattanooga was held at McLemore, a beautiful course atop the mountain and among the trees.



#### ONGOING SUPPORT

Some of the Helen Ross McNabb Foundation initiatives are one-time allocations and some are ongoing. The Foundation provides ongoing support to ensure the McNabb Center can continue its mission of improving lives and serving those with the greatest need and fewest resources.

#### MENTAL HEALTH

Providing quality mental health care is at the core of the McNabb Center's mission. The Helen Ross McNabb Foundation raises and contributes funds each year specifically for mental health programming.

East Tennessee Prescriber Fund \infty In order to provide quality mental health care to clients, the McNabb Center needs to attract top-notch medical staff. The Foundation launched the East Tennessee Prescriber Fund, which helps the Center bolster salaries for MDs and APNs working for the Center, keeping them closer to market value.

Therapeutic Preschool The McNabb Center offers the only two remaining Therapeutic Preschool programs in the state. Because of the Foundation's support totaling \$225,000 each year, the Knoxville preschool has sufficient funds to operate for 20 years at \$75,000 per year; and the Chattanooga location, which opened in 2020, has sufficient funding to operate for three years at \$150,000 per year.

East Tennessee Military Services Since the inception of the Center's Military Services program, staff have provided care to more than 808 military veterans and their loved ones. This

service is possible because of the Foundation's fundraising campaign, which raised \$2 million and supports the program at

\$150,000 annually.



#### SUBSTANCE USE

Hamblen County Jail to Work The McNabb Center's innovative Jail to Work program provides women incarcerated in the Hamblen County Jail the opportunity to receive a conditional release and receive recovery services, workforce training and supportive housing. The Helen Ross McNabb Foundation raised more than \$400,000 to sustain this program for three years.

Hamblen County Recovery Housing After women graduate from the Jail to Work program, they are provided an opportunity to transition to the Center's Recovery Housing, where they can receive the extended care needed to successfully transition back into their community. This housing opportunity was made possible by a \$750,000 Foundation fundraising campaign.

#### VICTIM SERVICES

Domestic Violence \( \sqrt{1} \) In 2016, the McNabb Center opened a new domestic violence shelter, thanks to a \$1.5 million fundraising campaign. The Foundation continues to support the Center's domestic violence services by funding the Score Keeper program, which provides positive male role models for children living at the shelter.

**SACET** The Sexual Assault Center of East Tennessee ensures that the basic, daily needs of survivors of sexual assault are being met. The Foundation has committed annual funding of \$50,000 to SACET for a minimum of 20 years to support the needs of survivors during their time of healing.

#### FOUNDATION GRANT

#### SUPPORTING THE MCNABB CENTER

The Helen Ross McNabb Foundation supports the McNabb Center through its grantmaking process. This year, the Foundation approved more than \$900,000 in grant funding to contribute to expanding and refreshing the Centerpointe program. The McNabb Center's Centerpointe addiction treatment facility serves individuals seeking medically monitored detox and inpatient substance abuse treatment regardless of their ability to pay. Centerpointe is the only treatment facility of its kind in East Tennessee to offer this lifesaving service to uninsured individuals with no means to provide payment.

The need has far surpassed the Center's capacity. This grant was part of the \$2.3 million campaign which will increase the capacity for residential addiction treatment and medically monitored detox beds by more than 30%, going from 46 existing beds to 65. The McNabb Center will also expand the common space, group meeting rooms, lobby, cafeteria and clinical office space as part of this process. Finally, the Center will add outdoor amenities such as a courtyard, walking trail and pavilion which will greatly benefit residents in treatment.
