

MCNABB CENTER WINS CRISIS SERVICES EXCELLENCE AWARD

This summer at the Tennessee Statewide Crisis Services & Suicide Prevention Conference hosted by Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, the McNabb Center won the Crisis Services Excellence Award for our Comprehensive Crisis Continuum. Many of these programs are first of their kind in the state and meet the needs of East Tennesseans experiencing a mental health emergency.

Serving both children and adults, McNabb's continuum includes:

- Family Walk-In Center
- Children's Crisis Stabilization Unit (CCSU)
- Mobile Crisis Unit (MCU) Expansion and Specialization
- Adult Crisis Stabilization Unit East and Upper East Tennessee
- Co-Response
- Behavioral Health Urgent Care Center (BHUCC)

CARF ACCREDITED UNTIL 2026

In March, CARF International awarded the Center its ninth 3-year accreditation! This is the highest level of accreditation offered by CARF, and this accomplishment exhibits significant conformance to the 1,892 CARF standards applied to the Center. The surveyors found that the McNabb Center was 99.4% compliant with all standards.

The McNabb Center was the first community mental health center awarded CARF accreditation in the state of Tennessee 22 years ago. By pursuing and achieving accreditation, the Center demonstrates that it meets international standards for quality and is committed to pursuing excellence.

CARF International's award letter states this achievement is an indication of "your organization's dedication and commitment to improving the quality of the lives of the persons served. Services, personnel and documentation clearly indicate an established pattern of conformance to standards. Your organization should take pride in achieving this high level of accreditation."

SUBSTANCE USE TREATMENT IN EAST TENNESSEE

In 2023, renovations begin on CenterPointe, the McNabb Center's residential substance use treatment facility. The renovation will expand CenterPointe from 46 to 72 beds and create and enhance treatment spaces to continue to promote a healing environment. Jennifer Hill, the McNabb Center's Senior Director of Adult Substance Use Treatment Services shares about substance use in our community and treatment offered by the Center.

Substance use is one of the most significant health crises that we are currently facing in this region of the country, and it's only getting more difficult due to the potency of the drugs we are seeing in our communities. According to the CDC's 2021 Drug Overdose Mortality by State, Tennessee is number two in the nation for rate of overdose deaths.

We're not dealing with one primary substance, such as alcohol dependence, anymore. We're dealing with a series of complex issues, significant co-occurring mental health disorders and a lot of unknowns. People who want the help come in to treatment not knowing exactly what they've been using, and current testing can't keep up with every substance or new derivative that's showing up. It is a dangerous and overwhelming problem. For example, Xylazine, an animal tranquilizer, is being mixed into other substances, and being linked to an increasing number of overdose deaths. The need for different treatment options is greater than it has ever been in the past

The McNabb Center has provided substance use services since 1997. As community needs have changed, different levels of care and interventions are needed to provide appropriate treatment. The Center has always had a reputation for going into a community and taking the time to truly assess for service gaps and needs within that particular county or region. This is why you don't see the same exact service array in every one of our locations. We are responsive to the unique needs of each community.

Substance use disorder is medical in nature, in the sense that it's a chronic disease. A wide range of psycho-social factors, such as trauma, affect the way in which the disease presents and the process of recovery. Think about people with diabetes who aren't following their diet exactly as directed. You don't just give up on them. You bring them back in and say "Okay. You're having a hard time following this diet. How can we change it or how can we help?"

The McNabb Center treats substance use disorders the same way. We do not give up on our clients, as the recovery process is a journey. We try different treatment options and meet each client where they are to address individual needs and to work through unique challenges. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration has four pillars of recovery; health, home, community and purpose. When we talk about treatment and recovery, we strive for positive improvements in each one of those pillars. These pillars apply to overall health and well-being of all individuals.

It takes a lot of courage to seek treatment. People are often at the most vulnerable and fragile point in their lives, and they are turning their lives over to someone else for help. It's a privilege for us to be there in that moment. They are placing a lot of trust in us to help guide them through that difficult and sometimes very painful process and we are fortunate to be walking alongside them throughout their journey to recovery. Recovery IS possible, and we will continue to instill hope and provide compassionate care in a safe, healing environment.

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MCNABB CENTER CUTS RIBBON ON NEW BLOUNT COUNTY WOMEN'S RECOVERY HOUSING

The McNabb Center celebrated the opening of a new women's recovery home in Blount County. The 10-bed house is a safe, healthy and sober living environment where women have access to the aftercare they need to maintain a successful recovery from substance use disorder and transition back into the community. The home was dedicated in honor of Richard and Joni Maples, longtime supporters of the McNabb Center.

The recovery home fosters a culture of recovery through a combination of the social model of recovery and clinical services provided by trained staff. Participants in the recovery home provide and receive support through peer led groups and participate groups led by clinical staff including life skills, work skills, employment placement, relapse prevention and planning for independence.

This project was made possible due to the financial support from Clayton, Blount County Government and the Creating Homes Initiative 2.0 Grant from the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.



CELEBRATING 75 YEARS - STAFF STORIES

Things have changed a lot over the years about working at the McNabb Center. Some of our longtime employees share what they remember about their early days at McNabb:

REMEMBER WHEN :

We had beepers and had to search for a payphone at some random location in order to return a call?

We used map books and had to understand latitude/longitude just to find our client's address?

We had paper charts and had to send out an all staff to request a record because it was sitting in someone's desk drawer and our notes were due?

When I was a case manager starting out, we had pagers assigned to us. I always had it attached to me and the only way I would know that someone called is when my phone

extension would buzz or the number I needed to call came up. It was also before GPS and MapQuest, and I had to call all my clients to ask them how to get to their house and write down their instructions.

When I came to McNabb, there was the Adult Center at Cherokee Trail and one story of the Children's Center. It was also pre-TennCare at the time. We did not have computers, voicemail or cell phones. We got our telephone messages in our boxes. If we wanted to send out an "all staff" we made copies and put them in everyone's mailboxes. We had beepers and carried around a bag of quarters for the payphones to return the pages. How times have changed! It is so amazing of how we have grown in my 31 years at the Center.

CLIENT STORY: BLOUNT COUNTY JAIL TO WORK PROGRAM

Kathy, a 50-year-old recovering addict, was homeless with no car, no access to running water and trying to find a part time job. She was struggling and ended up in prison on a felony charge. It was the first time that Kathy had been in jail. When she was approached by her lawyer about a program through the McNabb Center that would not only help her get clean, but help her find work and treat her mental health issues, she jumped at the chance to participate. After a lengthy assessment from McNabb's staff, they determined her eligibility, and she started Jail to Work, a 12-week program that takes women out of jail, promotes recovery from substance use disorder and places them in an alternative setting in order to ready them to reenter the community. The McNabb Center has Jail to Work programs in Hamblen and Claiborne counties, and a newly established program in Blount County.

Upon arriving to McNabb's Jail to Work facility, Kathy felt comfortable and safe right away. The staff were compassionate and friendly and the building was decorated to feel homey and welcoming. The bedrooms and bathrooms were color coordinated and each woman had her name on her bedroom door. Kathy felt like she had finally arrived at a place where she was wanted. She and the other women in the group hit it off right away and established a close camaraderie. She felt the staff and the women truly listen to each other, even in uncomfortable situations.

"Coming from jail, your feelings don't matter. Here, they don't look down on you for your opinion. You can voice your opinion and still be respected."

In addition to evidence-based mental health and substance use treatment, Jail to Work provides the participating women with daily life skills classes, such as nutrition and cooking courses through UT Extension, parenting and personal finance classes and a chance to work on their communication and relationship skills. The McNabb Center partners with local companies to provide employment opportunities for the women. A steady income allows the women to pay off their restitution, save up for a place to live and prepare to live independently.

Kathy is proud to be one of three women in the first class for Blount County's Jail to Work program. Even after the first few weeks of the program, she could see the light at the end of the tunnel.

"For once in my life I can actually see a future without being dependent on drugs."

After completing Jail to Work, she moved into the new Blount County Recovery Home, a safe, healthy and sober living environment. At the Recovery Home, Kathy will continue to receive support through peer-led groups, therapy, medication services, case management and relapse prevention skills.

"If there is a chance for a woman to participate in this program, they should," said Kathy. "Words aren't enough to express how much I needed this whole place."

OFFICERS, FIRST RESPONDERS AND MEDICAL STAFF COMPLETE CRISIS INTERVENTION TEAM TRAINING

Over fifty law enforcement officers, first responders and medical staff graduated from Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training in April and July. CIT trained officers undergo 40 hours of intensive training, which helps them identify mental health resources to assist people in crisis. The training connects officers with mental health professionals and other community agencies to create a team that can provide support when a challenging situation occurs. In addition, officers learn verbal de-escalation skills and experience scenario-based training on responding to crises.



April 2023 - This graduating class included staff from the Knox County Sheriff's Office, Knoxville Police Department, University of Tennessee Police Department, University of Tennessee Medical Center, Knoxville Fire Department, Knox County Schools Security Division, American Medical Response (AMR) and Homeland Security.



July 2023 - This graduating class included staff from the Alcoa Police Department, American Medical Response, Knox County Sheriff's Office, Knoxville Fire Department, Knoxville Police Department, Tennessee Office of Homeland Security, UT Medical Center and University of Tennessee Police Department.

Hamilton County Program Support

The McNabb Center offers supportive housing to more than 50 individuals facing severe and persistent mental illness in the Chattanooga area. By providing a comfortable home environment, we are able to improve the lives of our Chattanooga Clients. Our housing and supportive services help individuals retain their independence and maintain safety, all while being able to continue their recovery journey.

Sevier County Men's Re-Entry Program

The McNabb Center, along with the Sevier County General Sessions Court and Sheriff's Office, is currently offering a men's re-entry program as a way to provide rehabilitation services to men who are involved in the criminal justice system and are seeking mental health and substance use treatment.

Womens Recovery Housing

These funds will be used to build a 7, 2-bedroom unit Recovery Housing facility in Knox County, on-site offices and group meeting space for women that are post treatment from drug and alcohol use. The program promotes recovery of women who have a substance use disorder and consists of a drug-free living environment, substance abuse treatment, mental health treatment, work placement and reentry skills building. The goals of the program are recovery, reduce relapse and reintegration into the community.

Because staff are committed to the Center's mission of improving the lives of the people we serve, they raised more than **\$100,000** to support these initiatives.
